Come See “George Drouillard” and a Replica of a Lewis & Clark Expedition Camp: Get “in Touch” With History of our Nation and the Pacific Northwest! By Dr. Milada Allen

In 1803, President Thomas Jefferson asked Captain Meriwether Lewis (his personal secretary) to be the leader of the expedition west. The official reason given was to find a water route to the Pacific Ocean and to explore the ‘Louisiana Purchase’ land. However, Jefferson’s interest in land between the Mississippi River and the Pacific Ocean began in his childhood and grew with many reports of “explorations.” In 1783, he wrote to General G.R. Clark of his suspicion of British plans to colonize “*from the Mississippi to California.*” In 1785, Jefferson, Minister to France, learned that Louis XVI was sending a “scientific” expedition to the Pacific Northwest. Jefferson suspected that the King planned to start “*factories for the fur trade.*” Admiral John Paul Jones reported to him that the expedition’s goals included “*French fur trade and colonization on the northwestern coast.*”

In June 1803, Lewis asked his old friend, Captain William Clark, to help him lead the expedition. In October 1803, Captains Lewis and Clark went to St. Louis to finalize plans. In May 1804, Lewis and Clark, 45 men, and 150-pound Newfoundland, in 6 canoes and 2 boats, embark from Camp Wood (near St. Louis) on a challenging and dangerous 4,000-mile trek west. They “journeyed on” to find the water route to the Pacific Ocean. Sacagawea, a Shoshone woman, joined the expedition as a guide and interpreter and became “diplomat/messenger of peace.”

On October 10, 1805, the Lewis & Clark Expedition, a.k.a. “the Corps of Volunteers for Northwest Discovery” (“Corps of Discovery”), reached the Washington State (Clarkston). A few days later, they reached the Columbia River (near Pasco) and proceed on. On November 7, 1805, Capt. William Clark wrote: “Ocian in view! O! the joy.” (They see it 11 days later.)

The winter in the forested Pacific Northwest was wet and harsh. Discouraged, exhausted, cold, and wet members of the expedition voted to build a winter camp/fort on the south side of the Columbia River. In March 1806, the expedition embarked on the return journey home and reached St. Louis in September 1806. (They missed the Pacific Northwest summer!)

Lewis never wrote books on the expedition as planned. Later books were published using Captains’ journals written as Jefferson directed. These journals detailed day-to-day events; motivation, management, rationing, ailments, “first aid”; negotiations, trading; native people, chiefs, cultures, customs of many tribes; plants, insects, animals; topography, geography, geology; and detailed sketches and maps. These and other journals, and letters describe hopes, dreams, and goals; daily accomplishments and challenges; relatively primitive and limited tools and resources; creative solutions and innovations; human perseverance and undaunted courage.

In 1986, 182 years later, Roger Wendlick embarked on his own journey to gather the most complete collection of Lewis & Clark literature. In 1998, he sold it to the Lewis & Clark College to pay off huge acquisition expenses, to protect the collection, and provide research opportunity to thousands of Lewis & Clark fans. He was awarded “Lewis & Clark College Collector in Residence” title and regularly visits his vast collection and other resources housed in the Watsek Library Special Collections. Mr. Wendlick continues to acquire literature and “memorabilia” to share with Lewis & Clark fans. At the beginning of the 21st century, he joined the Discovery Expedition of St. Charles, Missouri and began a new career as a re-enactor and public speaker. His story was told on “*This American Life*,” NPR; the front page of *The Wall Street Journal* in 2003; *Le Monte* newspaper in Paris, France in 2004; and in *The Columbian* in March 2009 (dressed as Drouillard).

On July 4, 2009, you will have an opportunity to see a “Lewis & Clark encampment” and meet “George Drouillard” (Drewyer), the third most important member of the Corps of Discovery/First Person Interpreter. Roger Wendlick, a.k.a. “George Drouillard,” brings many visual aids and display items, shares history facts and trivia, and answers many questions that take years to research. In 2004, Mr. Wendlick received a **National Award for Preservation of History from the Daughters of the American Revolution**. He is a nationally recognized Lewis & Clark historian; an excellent public speaker; and an engaging and entertaining re-enactor. His audiences include conventions, book clubs, and schools. Don’t miss it! Come listen, “see and touch” history! Times on p. 1.

Mr. Wendlick wrote a book, Shotgun on my Chest, available at Powell Bookstore, Portland, OR. It details his research and search for Lewis & Clark Expedition, facts, journals; and extensive collection that needed protection.

ANSWERS TO MAJOR QUESTIONS¹

Stormwater Partners of Southwest Washington consortium was recently formed and includes Clark County and six cities: Battle Ground, Camas, La Center, Ridgefield, Vancouver, and Washougal. The consortium will provide neighborhoods and businesses with technical information and guidance to maintain their private stormwater facilities and protect our streams and surface waterways.

The County and cities will encourage the use of simple everyday practices to reduce stormwater pollution, which the Washington Department of Ecology has identified as the #1 threat to our urban water quality. (\$238,000 Ecology Department grant.)

Routine upkeep of private facilities is usually the responsibility of property owners which may include individuals, homeowners associations and businesses. Many residents may be unaware that some local regulations require them to maintain their neighborhoods and businesses through an approach that favors education and cooperation over enforcement and regulation.

A schedule for workshops, along with a website featuring a detailed guidebook, videos and other materials, should be available later this summer, with the first of more than a dozen workshops proposed in the fall.

To comply with laws, **new more restrictive stormwater** runoff management, bioswales, and stormwater retention/filtration facilities rules and regulations are now in effect. Visit Clark County website: www.clark.wa.gov.

Several homeowners associations had inquired regarding benefits/costs of owning/acquiring a stormwater facility versus turning it over to the County if they own it, or telling the developer to turn it over to the county if they do not own it. This is a complicated issue and decisions should include due diligence research, consultation with a neutral attorney, and full disclosure to the membership (investment & liability). Some HOAs are planning to turn their stormwater facilities over to the County (costs increased for annual environmental reports, insurance, maintenance/repairs). The County can require retrofits for older facilities, inspections, and a 2-year period to demonstrate that the system works properly. (HOAs, or the County, have the right to ask for an inspection report from the developer and/or the County.)

Community Mediation Services (CMS) offers Clark County residents a free informal private way to improve communications and resolve disagreements. Mediation is a voluntary process that helps you discuss difficult issues and develop your own solutions. CMS offers mediation for neighbor-to-neighbor disputes. For example: noise, boundary lines, easements, cultural differences, concerns involving animals, trees, and vegetation, interpersonal conflict/harassment, parking problems, concerns involving children and training. It also offers landlord-tenant mediation for issues regarding rental or lease issues, communication problems, and understanding rights and obligations.

Some of you were wondering how to get the best out of the soil in your garden or pasture. Free **soil testing kits** can be ordered from the Clark Conservation District (CCD). (360)883-1987, ext. 5. www.clarkcd.org. In September 2010, CCD will offer a new list of native plants for sale. (Prices are very low but vary depending on suppliers and availability.)

Many Felida NA members asked us about the status for the previously planned **Children's Celebration Area in Felida Park**. Conceptual sketches were developed by the Vancouver-Clark Parks for an area to be added in the Felida Park. These were unveiled on July 4, 2007 during annual children's parade activities. In 2008, Felida NA was asked to wait for guidelines to be developed by the Vancouver-Clark Parks and Clark County Public Works. This year, Felida NA, Parks Committee is cooperating with stakeholder group, Vancouver-Clark Parks, and County Public Works to finalize plans, criteria/guidelines, and permits to implement this project designed to celebrate children, their dreams, goals, and life and to provide play areas for kids with physical and visual impairments. McCann Road Committee: The Committee followed formal procedures and approached Clark County Board of Commissioners regarding safety concerns on McCann Road. The County staff was directed by Commissioners to conduct an analysis to mitigate failure at intersection of McCann/36th Ave. (LOS F). Website: Clark County/Public Works.

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS CONT'D

The new business at 12216 NW 36th Avenue in Felida is **Lake Shore Design Studio, LLC**. It is owned and operated by Felida resident Suzanne Simon, CID (360-326-4522). The studio specializes in furniture, accessories, window treatments, blinds and interior design services. To honor our communities, Suzanne is offering a 10% discount to neighbors in Felida, Salmon Creek, and Hazel Dell areas. The studio is on the July 4 parade route and will have an artist display event on that Sunday. Therefore, staff cannot participate in the July 4 event in Felida Park, but Suzanne and Artist Katie Berggren are supporting the event by donating frames and prints of mother & child for prizes.

2010 West Precinct Public Safety Open House will be held on September 18, 2010, Saturday, noon – 4:00 pm, at the West Precinct's Public Safety Complex – 505 NW 179th Street, by the Fairgrounds. Last year's safety fair was a tremendous success, attracting more than 1,500 people. Don't miss this year's exciting community-safety fair that includes canine demonstrations, vehicle extrications, bomb squad, and many community and public agency displays.

Many children in Clark County are living without the most basic things they need. According to the last census report, 9.7% of families and 16% of all children under the age of 18 lived below the poverty level in Clark County. With the recent economic crisis, higher unemployment, and recent budget cuts in social services, **Northwest Children's Outreach Vancouver (NCO)** must fill the rapidly widening gap between diminishing resources and growing percentages of children in need. NCO's community service and efforts are impressive!

NCO was formed in 2005 and served 4 agencies that year. Currently NCO serves 38 agencies working with families in need. Case workers identify specific basic needs and resources needed prior to placing 170 to 220 online orders per week. This volume is expected to grow as the economic recovery is just a distant glimmer in the near future. Therefore, the NCO would like to increase the "supply" to keep up with the growing "demand." It is an effective and efficient as it functions as a "one-stop clearing house" for a plethora of basic need items. Therefore, agencies do not have to contact a multitude of churches, friends, and organizations to gather needed items when and if available. The 2,600 square-foot warehouse contains shelves of used toys and books, racks of coats, and over 200 bins filled with assorted items. NCO is a non-profit charitable organization staffed by volunteers. Therefore, 99% of monetary (tax deductible) donations are used to provide assistance to children (after paying \$500 for rent, and \$150 electricity and phone bill each month). Volunteers purchase requested items frugally, on line, or buy in bulk to get discounts, in addition to using donated items to fill weekly agency orders (e.g., clothing, baby equipment, shoes, diapers).

The Season is the Reason for Yard Debris Service!

Did you know that about 25% of the solid waste stream is compostable? Materials like leaves, grass and yard waste can be composted. For about the price of one matinee movie ticket, you can have up to 96 gallons of yard debris picked up every-other-week. Right at your curb! Yard debris that is placed in your garbage container is not pulled out at the processing facility; it ends up in the landfill as garbage. Waste Connections' yard debris service is a sanitary way to locally recycle yard waste that you cannot compost yourself. All yard debris from Clark County is processed within the region and is available locally for purchase as compost!

Waste Connections' curbside yard debris service is a convenient alternative to self-hauling yard debris saving you time and fuel. If you've hesitated to sign up because you don't think that you would utilize the service year around, you don't have to! Waste connections offers an "on-call" service option that you can switch to during the months when you do not need the service as often. Disposing of Sharps, Medications, and Mercury Thermometers Safely

Have you ever wondered what to do with unwanted medications? How to clean-up a broken mercury thermometer? Where to dispose of syringes and needles? If so, then Clark County's newest medical waste brochures and web pages are just what you need to answer many of your questions:

E-Cycle Washington, CREAM and the ReStore

As of January 2010, Waste Connections is prohibited from accepting computers , monitors, TVs and laptops as garbage. The restrictions are the result of a new Oregon Law banning the landfilling of old electronic equipment. Because the landfill that serves Clark County is located in Oregon, the law applies to Clark County customers. However, you can still get rid of old televisions, computers, and monitors for free, thanks to a Washington law requiring manufacturers to underwrite a statewide electronics recycling program.

E-Cycle Washington is a program that provides free recycling of computers, monitors, laptops and TVs. Peripherals and accessories such as mice, printers and scanners are NOT covered under the program. For recycling locations, please call 1-800-recycle or visit www.ecyclewashington.org.

CREAM, the Computer Reuse, Education and Marketing program, is now a non-profit organization focusing on computer reuse. CREAM accepts used computers, computer parts and other consumer electronics from the public at no charge. CREAM prefers to accept only working equipment that is no more than 5 years old, though it will accept non-working or older equipment at this time. Used computers are available for purchase in the CREAM Thrift Store. CREAM is located at 5000 E Fourth Plain Blvd. Suite F, in the same building as the Habitat for Humanity Re-Store. Donation hours are 9am to 4pm, Tuesday through Saturday. For additional information, please see www.upgradeyourcommcommunity.org. (Need volunteers.)

The Habitat for Humanity ReStore is a thrift store that sells donated new and used building and home improvement products. The stock is constantly changing but often includes lighting fixtures, sinks, toilets, major appliances, floor coverings and furniture. Sales from the ReStore help build homes for low income families. The Clark County ReStore is located at 5000 E Fourth Plain Blvd. Store hours are 9am to 5pm Tuesday through Saturday.
